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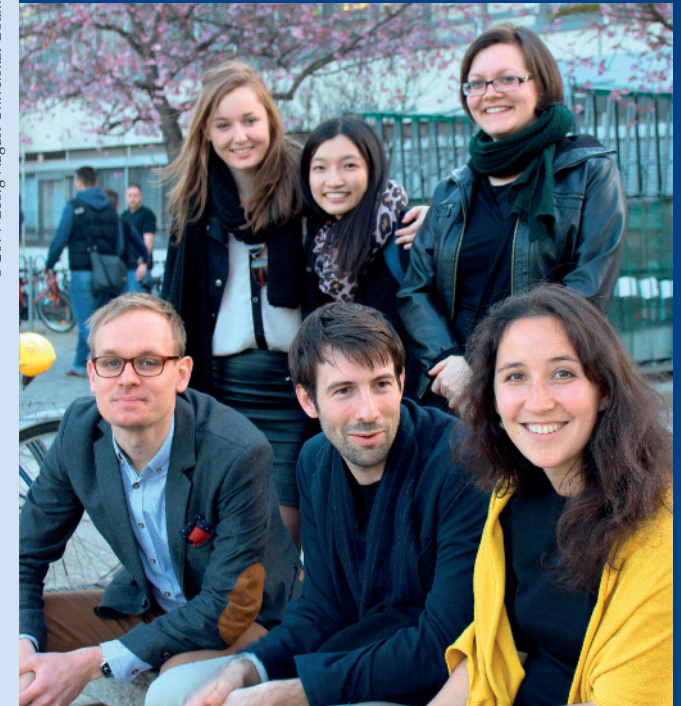

The Euroculture Programme qualifies students to analyse various dimensions of the European integration processes in a global context and to undertake an elaborate study on the past, present and future of cultural, historical and political developments in Europe.

Why study Euroculture?

In the Euroculture Programme, students acquire practical skills and interpersonal competences, which are based on a thorough and problem-oriented understanding of crucial topics and developments in Europe.

In addition to a comprehensive knowledge of European matters, students master specific practical competences, such as project management, intercultural communication, as well as research and professional project proposal preparation.

Because of its multidisciplinary approach, the Euroculture Programme stands out from many other European and Regional Study programmes. Ever since Euroculture was established in 1999, it has been used as a way of reflecting in an interdisciplinary manner on the many different expressions and manifestations of identity. This approach focuses on the (self-)understandings of political entities, social groups and individuals, both within and beyond Europe.

The Euroculture Programme is an inter-university project. Students spend the first semester at Georg-August-Universität Göttingen. In the second semester they move to one of the partner universities of the Euroculture consortium:

- » Rijksuniversiteit Groningen (Netherlands)
- » Universidad de Deusto (Spain)
- » Uniwersytet Jagielloński w Krakowie (Poland)
- » Univerzita Palackého v Olomouci (Czech Republic)
- » Université de Strasbourg (France)
- » Università degli Studi di Udine (Italy)
- » Uppsala Universitet (Sweden).

In the third semester students can either choose a professional track (internship), or a research track at one of the Euroculture consortium universities based on the student's research and/or professional interests.

Our non-European partner universities for the research track are:

- » University of Pune (India)
- » Indiana University (USA)
- » University of Osaka (Japan)
- » Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México.

Mandatory mobility between two or more consortium universities gives students the chance to gain diverse academic and personal experiences. This develops the students' level of intercultural competence, enables them to establish broad professional networks and increases their chances on the global job market.

Euroculture enables students to

- » Conduct research on European political, cultural and social integration processes in their different dimensions
- » Study Europe's relations and mutual exchanges with the wider world

- » Pursue a professional or research track in order to acquire relevant professional skills and competencies or deepen their research skills and theoretical knowledge
- » Participate in an international summer school (Intensive Programme) for seven days
- » Attend public lectures and seminars by high-profile guest-speakers from around the world.
